

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




The Chronological Chart of Early Oakland Township History

December 5,	1796	Deputy Surveyor Thomas Welch, Chain Bearers Richard Stooks, and Moses Johnson and Axemen Finlay Malcolm, Alexander Thompson, Thomas Baxter, Isaac Everson and Thomas Aaron started to survey the present day Township of Oakland, known as the Townsend Gore, Norfolk County.
May 22,	1797	 The first grants of land were made in the Township of Oakland. The grantees were: Robert Pilkington - Lot 2, Concession 2, Lot 1, Concession 3, and Lots 1 and 2, Concession 4 - 800 acres. Bulah Millard - Lot 4, Concession 4 and Lot 5, Concession 5 - 300 acres. M. Andrew Myers - Lot 1, Concession 5 and Lot 1 & 2, Concession 6 - 500 acres. John Ray - Lot 3, Concession 5 - 200 acres.
	1798	The Townsend Gore became known as the Burford Gore.
January 1,	1800	The triangular tract of land was added to Burford Township.
December 13, 1801		Eliakim Malcolm, son of Finlay Malcolm, was born in Oakland.
1800 - 1803		Courts of Oakland and Burford were held at the house of James Munro, in the Township of Charlotteville, Norfolk County.
January 3,	1803	The first instrument is dated and is a deed from John Smith Jr., to Matthew Messecar of Lot 12, Concession 1, Burford Gore - 200 acres.
February 8,	1804	A deed from William Slawson to Haggai Westbrook of Lot 7, Concession 1, Burford Gore - 200 acres.
	1804	The courts of Oakland and Burford were removed to the house of Job Lodor, innkeeper at Turkey Point.

The village of Oakland was laid out by Deputy Surveyor Thomas Welch.

The village of Scotland was laid out and surveyed by Eliakim Malcolm.


- Battle of Malcolm's Mills. American General Duncan McArthur crossed over from Detroit in October, 1814, with a force of 700 Ohio and Kentucky volunteers, United States Rangers, and Indians. They planned to destroy the mills of the Grand River region and the head of Lake Ontario. On the way to Lake Ontario, McArthur heard of a Canadian military force gathered at Malcolm's Mills, Oakland. After the battle, the American soldiers burned the grist and saw mills. This was the very last battle fought on Canadian soil.
- 1815 1825 Courts were held in Vittoria, Norfolk County, from 1815 to 1825 when the courthouse was burned, then in St.Thomas and London in 1826.
 - An Act was passed, making the Gore of land attached to Burford Township, into the separate, distinct, Township of Oakland.
 - School built in the village of Oakland. Presbyterians held services in the school.
 - 1834 Episcopal Methodists were organized as a congregation.
 - 1840 A jail was built in Woodstock.

First Post Office opened in Oakland. Postmaster - John Toyne.

January 21, 1850 The first meeting of the Oakland Township Council was held.

Members present: Reeve Eliakim Malcolm, Councillors James
Malcolm, John Eddy, Charles Chapin and Wellington
McAlister.

April 15, 1852 The first meeting of the Provisional Municipal Council of the County of Brant took place in the Town Hall of Brantford.

Geographical Locations of Oakland Township

East Oakland

Located two miles east of the village of Oakland, on the banks of Malcolm Creek, was a settlement named East Oakland. In 1813, this grant of land was conveyed to Daniel Secord and his sons John and Asa. Mordecai Sayles received in the neighbourhood of 600 acres. Other grantees were George Woodley and Henry Slaght.

Frogtown

Frogtown was a small settlement about one mile east of East Oakland. It was the spot where the old Boston Baptist Church was built. Rev. Peter Fairchild was the first minister.

Maple Grove

The little village of Maple Grove was two miles north of Oakland. Many of the early settlers were of Scottish descent. Charles Chapin received a crown grant in 1803, one mile west of the main intersection of Maple Grove.

Oakland, community, Oakland Township, Brant County Position 43° 02' 80° 20'

"An abundance of oak trees in the early days suggested the name of this village, situated about ten miles southwest of Brantford.

The first settler on the site was Finlay Malcolm, a United Empire Loyalist who came from Nova Scotia with his wife, six sons, and four daughters.

The village was surveyed in 1810 and was first named Perth, then Malcolm's Mills after the pioneer family.

During the War of 1812, an invading American force of about 700 men under Brigadier-General Duncan McArthur attacked a body of some 150 militia at Malcolm's Mills on November 6, 1814. McArthur's intention was to devastate the Grand River settlements and the region around the head of Lake Ontario which was supplying the British forces on the Niagara frontier. The Canadian forces, made up of Norfolk, Oxford and Middlesex regiments, resisted strongly, but were overwhelmed. A historic plaque in Oakland's Community Park commemorates the event.

On January 21, 1850, the first municipal council met at the tavern of Isaac B. Malcolm and chose Eliakim Malcolm Reeve of the Township of Oakland."

Page 98, "Places in Ontario" Part III, N-Z Nick & Helma Mika, Belleville, Ont. - 1983 Oakland, township, Brant County Position 43° 02' 80° 21'

"Oakland, the smallest township in the County of Brant, contains about 10,676 acres. Shaped like a right-angled triangle, its longest side adjoins the Township of Brantford on the north, Burford Township on the west, and on the south, the Township of Townsend in the County of Norfolk.

Surveyed in 1796 by Thomas Welch as part of the Township of Townsend, it was known as the Townsend Gore. An Act of Parliament on January 1, 1800, added this tract of land to the Township of Burford and named it Burford Gore. In 1821, Burford Gore was formed into the separate Township of Oakland, so named for the many oak trees which extended throughout the area. It was administered from Woodstock until 1850 when Oakland Township was made independent, and its first council met January 21, 1850 at Isaac B. Malcolm's tavern at Malcolm's Mills, now the village of Oakland. Eliakim Malcolm was appointed first Reeve and John Toyne, first Clerk, with James Malcolm, John Eddy, Charles Chapin and Wellington McAlister named as members of Council.

With his wife and family, Finlay Malcolm, a United Empire Loyalist from Nova Scotia, arrived before 1802, the earliest settler. Others following were: Wm. Thompson Sr., John Eddy, Daniel Secord, Robert Eadie Sr., Robert Elliott, James Lloyd, Moses Baldwin, George Cunningham, Silas Burch, Richard Cowles, Angus Campbell, Samuel Thompson, James Knight, Hiram Westbrook, James McIlwrath, Asa Secord and A. B. Smith. John Loder operated early saw and grist mills and Henry Gates ran a carding mills. By 1875, the township had six public schools, two post offices, three hotels and three churches: Baptist, Canada Methodist, Episcopal Methodist. The population was 2,000.

At the Community Park, Oakland village, there is a Historical Plaque commemorating "The Battle of Malcolm's Mills, 1814" when the American General McArthur, with some thousand mounted riflemen defeated the few hundred militia at Malcolm's Mills and burned the mill. On his way out of the province via Long Point, he also burned the mill at Waterford in Townsend Township. At the crossroads there is a Pioneer Cemetery where the tombstones have been placed in two graduated semi-circular rows.

Oakland Township's main villages are Oakland and Scotland. The population today is approximately 1,296."

Page 98, "Places in Ontario" Part III, N-Z Nick & Helma Mika, Belleville, Ont. - 1983 Scotland, police village, Oakland Township, Brant County Position 43° 01' 80° 22'

"The village of Scotland, south of Brantford, was laid out by Eliakim Malcolm, a United Empire Loyalist of Scottish ancestry and the son of Finlay Malcolm, who is considered the founder of the township.

During the Rebellion of 1837 in Upper Canada, the village of Scotland was the rallying point for some 300 local "Patriots" under the leadership of Dr. Charles Duncombe, a prominent physician active in the reform movement in the London District. Duncombe planned to move against Brantford and have his followers join forces with William Lyon Mackenzie.

During the night of December 13th, word came of Mackenzie's defeat at Montgomery's Tavern and the approach of Allan McNab's strong loyal force of militia soldiers, causing the Rebels to disperse. Many, among them Eliakim Malcolm and his brother James, fled to the United States. In later years, Eliakim became the first Warden of Brant County.

Scotland's post office was opened in 1852; the first postmaster was Henry Lyman."

Oakland Township - The Smallest Township of Brant County

Oakland Township, the smallest township in Brant County, is shaped almost like a right-angled triangle. Originally, this triangular tract of land was known as the "Townsend Gore", and was surveyed in 1796, by Deputy-Surveyor Thomas Welch, as a part of the Township of Townsend in Norfolk County. By Act 38, George III, Chapter 5, Section 34, 1798, which came into force January 1, 1800 it was enacted "that the triangular tract of land called Townsend Gore be added to and become part of the Township of Burford", of Oxford County. By Act 2, George IV, Chapter 3, Section 11, 1821, it was further enacted "that the gore of land attached to the Township of Burford be formed into a separate and distinct township by the name of the Township of Oakland". By Act 38, 1798, the Counties of Norfolk, Oxford and Middlesex formed the London District, so Oakland Township formed part of the County of Oxford, in the London District, and remained so until the reconstruction of Oxford County in 1851 when Oakland Township became part of Brant County. The first municipal council met at the tavern of Isaac B. Malcolm in the village of Oakland on January 21, 1850. The names of the gentlemen who composed this first council were Eliakim Malcolm, James Malcolm. John Eddy, Charles Chapin and Wellington McAlister. Eliakim Malcolm, Esq. served as the first Reeve of Oakland Township and John Toyne, was the first Clerk and Postmaster of the village.

Oakland Township 1842

Wm. H. Smith, in his "Canadian Gazetteer of 1842", page 132, describes Oakland Township in the following words: "Oakland Township in Brock District is bounded on the NE by the Township of Brantford, on the west by Burford Township, and in the South by Townsend Township. In Oakland, 9,182 acres are taken up, 5,850 of which are under cultivation.... A large cedar swamp extends from the Township of Brantford into the NW of Oakland and reaches nearly to the centre of the township. The village of Scotland is situated in the west of the township, close to the county between Oakland and Burford and the village of Oakland is a little south of the centre of the Township. There is 1 grist and 2 saw mills in the township. The population in 1842 was 464 persons who were principally of the Scotch descent."

Oakland Village 1842

On page 133 of the Canadian Gazetteer, Wm. H. Smith describes Oakland village in the following words: "Oakland is a village in the township of Oakland, situated on the road leading from Brantford to Simcoe. It contains 160 inhabitants. P. O. post daily. Professions and trades consist of 1 grist, 1 saw mill, carding machine, fulling mill, 1 store, 2 taverns, 1 hatter, 1 wagon maker, 1 blacksmith, 1 tailor and 1 shoemaker."

The first settler on the site was Finlay Malcolm, a U.E. L., who came from Nova Scotia with his wife, 6 sons and 4 daughters. The village of Oakland was surveyed in 1810 and was first named "Perth" for a county in Central Scotland. Later, it was named "Oakland" because a ridge of oaktrees ran through the township and village.

Scotland Village 1842

According to Wm. H. Smith in 1842: "Scotland is a village in the southwest of the township of Oakland. It contains 150 inhabitants. Professions and trades consist of 2 stores, 2 taverns, 1 tannery, 1 saddler, 1 chair maker, 1 cabinet maker, 1 blacksmith. There is a carding machine and fulling mill near the village.

Scotland is located on Malcolm's Creek and was founded by the Malcolms. The Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo railroad ran through the village.

Early pioneers of Oakland township were Moses Baldwin, Silas Burch, Angus Campbell, Richard Cowles, George Cunningham, Robert Eddie Sr., John Eddy, Robert Elliott, James Knight, James Lloyd, Wellington McAlister, James McIlwrath, Shubel D. Malcolm, Jonathan Plowman, A. B. Smith, John Taylor, Wm. Thompson, and Mordecai Westbrook.

The Early Land Patents of the Burford Gore of Oakland Township

In 1796, Deputy-Surveyor Thomas Welsh surveyed the Townsend Gore, the Burford Gore which became known as Oakland Township. The first individual land owners of the six concessions were as follows:

In 1791, the Constitutional Act was passed dividing the Province of Quebec into Lower Canada (Province of Quebec of today) and Upper Canada (Province of Ontario of today). Lieutenant-Governor John Graves-Simcoe planned for 200 acre lots in townships of Upper Canada.

One-seventh of the land in a township was set aside as "Clergy Reserves" for the support and maintenance of the Protestant clergy. Another one-seventh of the land was set aside as "Crown Reserves", for the support and upkeep of the reigning sovereign and government.

War of 1812

Battle of Malcolm's Mills - Oakland Village, 1814

During the end of the War of 1812-1814, the last battle fought on Canadian soil took place at Malcolm's Mills, in the village of Oakland.

In October 1814, American Brigadier-General Duncan McArthur crossed into Canada from Detroit, Michigan. His force consisted of about seven hundred Ohio and Kentucky volunteers, United States Rangers, and Indians. Their plan was to destroy the food supplies of the Grand River and the head of Lake Ontario areas by burning the mills.

On his way to the Lake Ontario area, Brigadier-General McArthur heard of a Canadian military force gathered at Malcolm's Mills (Oakland Village).

A commemorative plaque at the Community Park in Oakland tells the story of the battle as follows:

The Battle of Malcolm's Mills - 1814

In October, 1814, an invading American force of about 700 men under Brigadier-General Duncan McArthur advanced rapidly up the Thames Valley. He intended to devastate the Grand River Settlements and the region around the head of Lake Ontario which supplied British forces on the Niagara frontier. McArthur reached the Grand, and after an unsuccessful attempt to force a crossing, attacked a body of some 150 militia here at Malcolm's Mills (Oakland) on November 6. Canadian forces, comprising elements of the 1st and 2nd Norfolk, 1st Oxford, and 1st Middlesex regiments, put up a spirited resistance but were overwhelmed.

Government Grants for Services Rendered During the War of 1812-1814

The following people of the Gore of Burford (Oakland Township) received grants for services rendered during the War of 1812-1814:

"Among those who received Government grants for services during the War of 1812 were Miller Laurason, Dumfries, private 2nd York;

Henry Slaght, Oakland private 2nd Norfolk; David Heron and George Winegarden, privates 4th Lincoln; Andrew Heron, Jr., private 2nd Norfolk; Matthias Woodley, Burford Gore; Stephen Douglas, Grand River; George Rouse, Joshua Rouse, Abraham Rounds, Jonathan Stevens, all of Burford, privates 1st Oxford; Adam Yeigh, Burford, Sergeant in Capt. White's first flank company and G.W. Potter, Burford, Sergeant 3rd Lincoln. These grants were in Moore, Brooke, Ekfrid, Nissouri and Zorra Townships. Jos. Beamer, Martin Boughner, Chas. Glover, John Glover, Sam Jay, Peter Lefler, Anthony Sovereen, John Sovereen and Conrad Winegarden, of Townsend, received grants as privates of one hundred acres each in Zorra. Others receiving scrip and land were John Woodley and Geo. Woodley, of Burford Gore; Abraham DeCou, Geo. Lane, Horatio Fowler, Hugh Malcolm, Sergeant Duncan Malcolm, John Malcolm, Josiah Brown, Anthony Westbrook, Abner DeCou, Peter Martin, John W. Clark, Joseph Fowler. Samuel Fagerson, Jas. Secord and Henry C. Beamer, of Burford; Peter Malcolm and Neal Brown, of Burford Gore; and Alex. Allen, Grand River. These grants were nearly all in Dawn Township."

SCOTLAND

<u>Duncombe's Uprising - 1837 - Village of Scotland</u>

Dr. Charles Duncombe (1791 - 1867), prominent physician and politician, was leader of the militant reform movement in the London District at the time of the Rebellion of 1837. He rallied the local "Patriots" at the settlement of Scotland, planning to move against Brantford and Hamilton and join forces with William Lyon Mackenzie. On December 13, 1837, word was received of the latter's defeat at Montgomery's Tavern and of Col. Allan McNab's approach with a strong Loyalist force. Disheartened, Duncombe's followers dispersed during the night and he fled to the United States.

Rebels of Oakland Township

- Brown, Malcolm jailed Hamilton, 17 December 1837, petitioned. Bailed June 1838. Age 34, married, American, farmer, 100 unpatented acres. Lived on Concession 3,4, Oakland Township.
- Chapin, Charles jailed Hamilton, 23 December 1837, petitioned. Bailed August 1838 or October 1838. Age 29, married, American, Congregationalist, farmer, unknown property on Concession 3 & 5, Oakland Township.
- 3. <u>Chapin, Lyman</u> jailed Hamilton, 16 December 1837, petitioned. Bailed 6 June 1838. Age 24, married, American, farmer, 100 patented acres.
- Coon, Peter jailed Hamilton, 15 December 1837, not indicted. Freed 21 March 1838, blacksmith, Oakland.
- Duncombe, Dr. Charles Leader of the Uprising, absconded, indicted, named in Oct. 1838 Proclamation. Age 45, married, American, 19 years in province. Medical doctor, lived in Burford, 1,004 patented and 240 unpatented acres.
- 6. <u>Elliott, Robert</u> jailed Hamilton, 15 December 1837, petitioned. Bailed June 1838. English Congregationalist, tanner, married.
- 7. <u>Foster, Alonzo</u> jailed Hamilton, 15 December 1837, not indicted. Freed 20 March 1838. Age 18, single, farm labourer, no property.
- 8. <u>Ladon, (Laden, Ladan, Landon) Peter</u> jailed Hamilton, 16 December 1837, not indicted. Freed 15 March 1838. Irish labourer, Oakland, married, no property.
- 9. <u>Malcolm, Edy (Eddy)</u> bailed Hamilton, 23 December 1837, freed. Jailed Hamilton 23 July 1838, (on suspicion of being involved in Short Hills Raid?), freed 31 July 1838. Age 21, single, American, farmer's son.
- Malcolm, Eliakim a leader of the uprising, absconded, named in 22 October 1838
 Proclamation. Age 36, married, American, Congregationalist, deputy surveyor.
 Lived on Concession 1, 330 patented and 600 unpatented acres. Chosen as Magistrate in 1833.



Oakland Village (Page 142-143)

Oakland is a post village in the Township of Oakland, situated on the stage coach road leading from Brantford to Simcoe, a distance of nine miles from Brantford and fifteen miles from Simcoe. It contains two churches, Methodist Episcopal and New Connection Methodist, both are handsome frame buildings; a good town hall, a flour and grist mill, fifty by thirty feet, four stories high, with three runs of stones, and a good saw mill, which cuts about half a million feet of lumber annually. Both mills are owned and carried on by John Vivian, Esq. There are three stores, a post office, two wagon shops, three blacksmith shops, one shoe shop, one tailor, and two hotels. The "Oakland House Hotel", kept by Mr. Jordan Beebe, is worthy of the confidence of commercial travellers and the public generally. Mails daily. Population 100.

Scotland Village (Page 147-148)

Scotland is a post village situated on the town line of Burford and Oakland. The stage coach road leading from Paris to Simcoe passes through the village. It is fourteen miles from Paris and eleven miles from Brantford. It contains two churches, Baptist and Congregational. The Congregational Church was formed in 1835, under the ministry of the Rev. James Nall, who came to this country from England under the direction of the Colonial Missionary Society. It was associated with the church of the same order at Burford. Towards the close of the year 1843, Rev. Nall removed to another part of the vineyard of the Lord. After some months of spiritual destitution, the Rev. W. F. Clark was installed as pastor, October 18, 1844, and in the spring of 1846, tendered his resignation with a view to leaving the province. The Rev. W. H. Allsworth visited in August 1846, and laboured as temporary supply during the following winter. On August 7, 1847, the church invited M. William Hay, a graduate of the Congregational College, to accept the pastoral oversight of them. He entered upon his ministerial duties on October 13, and was ordained paster on January 19, 1848. At this date, there was no church building and the members numbered thirty, and were in the habit of assembling for worship in a school house. The church edifice was opened for divine service in 1849. Since then, 170 members have been added to the church roll. In the spring of 1868, the Rev. Wm. Hay, on account of poor health, resigned the pastorate, but has been recalled thereto and is now in the position which he has sustained for more than twenty years.

Dr. J. R. Malcolm's grist mill contains two run of stone and is built of frame, three stories high, and thirty by fifty feet.

Mr. Robert Gillespie is engaged in the manufacture of leather. Harness, kip and calf leathers are chiefly turned out here; The tannery is of frame, two stories high, and twenty-four by fifty feet.

There are four stores and a post office, three wagon and blacksmith shops, three coopers shops, one cabinet and tin shop, a good woollen factory, thirty by thirty-six feet, two stories, where Mr. Malcolm employs six hands in carding, cloth dressing and manufacturing work, generally working all seasons of the year.

A united grammar and common school, where 120 pupils are in training, two good hotels, the "Scotland House Hotel", kept by Mr. P. J. Pilkey, is in first class style for the accommodation of commercial travellers and the public generally. There is, in connection with the hotel, a livery stable. "The Commercial Hotel", kept by Mr. Jonathan Thatcher, is worthy of like patronage. Mails daily. Population 100.






